### **Pro Bono**

Through our Pro Bono Program students provide pro bono assistance to government agencies, non-profits, and NGOs, in Boston, throughout the US, and around the world. More than 37% of the class of 2017 volunteered more than 20,100 hours of service. During our pro bono Spring Break 2017, more than 72 students participated in pro bono work providing over 2,500 hours of service. Students provided immigration pro bono service to non-profits in Texas, Arizona, New York, Washington, DC, Florida, and California. Students also worked with government agencies and non-profits to provide pro bono legal services in New Orleans, Washington, DC, Navajo Nation, and locally in the Boston area. Every graduate who provides fifty hours of pro bono service receives recognition at the Graduation Awards Celebration. Students who complete the voluntary Pro Bono Pledge of 50 hours of service may also participate in the Public Interest Designation Program (PIDP). The PIDP is designed to encourage, guide, and recognize students who are committed to public service. The PIDP is a holistic approach to legal education which prepares students both academically and experientially to begin a career in the public sector immediately upon graduation. Students who complete the Program's four academic and experiential requirements are designated as Public Interest Designation Fellows. The requirements to be named Fellows are: - Complete 15 credits of public interest coursework. - Participate in experiential learning offerings at a public interest placement. - Spend at least one summer interning with a public sector employer. - Complete BC Law's pro bono pledge by participating in 50 hours of public service. More than 20% of the Class of 2017 have been named as Public Interest Designation Fellows.
